### LAND O'SKY MEETING

Members gathered at the Fletcher Library on January 19 o for their quarterly meeting. Superintendent *Ken O'Brian* welcomed the members and guests and outlined the agenda for the meeting. He started by asking the various clubs represented to bring us up-to-date on their activities.

Chuck Place spoke on the behalf of the <u>French Board N'pire</u> of Hendersonville. They are now located on Seventh Avenue diagonally across the street and tracks from the Hendersonville Railroad Depot and are open on Saturdays from 10 am until 2 pm. This is a beautiful N scale modular operation that has grown to the size where portability is no longer practical.

Ken O'Brian spoke about the <u>Apple Valley Model Railroad Club</u> in Hendersonville. They are also open on Saturday from 10 am until 2 pm. They have acquired a (real) semaphore and are in the process of getting the appropriate equipment to display it trackside behind the depot. 
Finally, the members reelected Ken as Superintendent, and Dave Hull as Paymaster. These meetings are always interesting and informative, and well worthy of our time.


# Early Steam locomotives

# **Early Steam Power**

Note: This is a continuation of a series started in November 2013.

As the development of steam engines progressed through the 18th century, various attempts were made to apply them to road and railway use. In 1784, William Murdoch, a Scottish inventor, built a prototype steam road locomotive. An early working model of a steam rail locomotive was designed and constructed by steamboat pioneer John Fitch in the US probably during the 1780s or 1790s. His steam locomotive used interior bladed wheels guided by rails or tracks. The model still exists at the Ohio Historical Society Museum in Columbus.

The first full-scale working railway steam locomotive was built by Richard Trevithick in the United Kingdom and, on 21 February 1804, the world's first railway journey took place as Trevithick's unnamed steam locomotive hauled a train along the tramway in South Wales. Accompanied with Andrew Vivian, it ran with mixed success.



The design incorporated a number of important innovations that included using high-pressure steam which reduced the weight of the engine and increased its efficiency. Trevithick visited the Newcastle area in 1804 and he had a ready audience of colliery owners and engineers. The visit was so successful that the colliery railways in northeast England became the leading centre for experimentation and development of the steam locomotive.

Trevithick continued his own steam propulsion experiments through another trio of locomotives, concluding with the *Catch Me Who Can* in 1808.

Four years later, the successful twin-cylinder locomotive *Salamanca* by Matthew Murray for the edge railed rack and pinion Middleton Railway debuted in 1812. In 1825 George Stephenson built the *Locomotion* for the Stockton and Darlington Railway, in northeast England, which was the first public steam railway in the world.

In 1829, he built *The Rocket* which was entered in and won the Rainhill Trials. This success led to Stephenson establishing his company as the pre-eminent builder of steam locomotives used on railways in the UK, US and much of Europe. <sup>[9]</sup> The Liverpool and Manchester Railway opened a year later making exclusive use of steam power for passenger and freight trains.

The US started developing steam locomotives in 1829 with the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad's *Tom Thumb*. This was the first locomotive to run in America, although it was intended as a demonstration of the potential of steam traction, rather than as a revenue-earning locomotive. Many of the earliest locomotives for American railroads were imported from Great Britain, including the *Stourbridge Lion* and the *John Bull* (still the oldest operable engine-powered vehicle in the United States of any kind, as of 1981) but a domestic locomotive manufacturing industry was quickly established, with locomotives like the *DeWitt Clinton* being built in the 1830s.

The first railway service in Continental Europe (or for that matter, anywhere outside the UK and the US) was opened on 5 May 1835 in Belgium, between Mechelen and Brussels. The name of the locomotive used was *The Elephant*.


